Marking the 15th anniversary of ground-breaking Glasgow charity, The Village Storytelling Centre, this four day festival brings mesmerising performances from innovative storytellers from across the UK with exciting new work, many of whom are performing in Scotland for the first time. The festival will also feature performances from community groups across Glasgow, who have each worked with us through story and another art form in a variety of different ways over the past year. These groups share aspects of their "Village" and what that community means to them. Running alongside the festival is a series of thought provoking symposia which ask how storytelling benefits us in society and indeed, how this ancient tradition remains relevant and contemporary in the modern world. HIT THE ROAD JACK

Daniel Serridge - Storyteller Geraldine Heaney - Filmmaker

For 10 weeks pupils from Linburn academy worked on a filmic rendition of Jack and the Beanstalk. Pupils climbed into teapots, ran with golden eggs and planted magic beans in different school locations, celebrating the importance of their school to them and the safe spaces they use on a daily basis. This project worked with six pupils with complex learning needs to explore the relationship between film and storytelling whilst celebrating the incredibly supportive relationship between teachers and pupils in Linburn academy.

THE TRUTH

Naomi O Kelly - Storyteller Morven Innes - Filmmaker

In 2015 our "Kidding On" group were given a high-adrenaline challenge: To devise a short performance from scratch in just 5 sessions – that's 8 hours! The performance took place in April 2015 and captures "The Truth" about how their community, Pollok, was created. This documentary charts their journey through the process of devising and creating the performance and what their community and The Village Storytelling Centre mean to them.

KEEP YOUR KENNISHEAD

Enjoy some of the silly comings and goings in a community hall as seen through the eyes of the young people using it. Working in partnership with Aberlour Child Care Trust, the young people aged 11 to 20 created a situation comedy about the place that means a lot to them. Not only a space of safety and security but also a space for fun and laughter, this project demonstrated the joy and support that young people receive from their local community hall and the workers from Aberlour who care for them. At a time when community space is so hard to come by, this project aimed to shed some light on a place that local people work so hard to keep running.

THE PLACE I AM

A short documentary trip around the Village as we prepare for the festival. According to Donald Morrison, a Stornoway cooper who transcribed many of the stories which were spoken around Stornoway harbour in the early 1800s, the Steward of St Kilda once set out for the archipelago, with his wife aboard a simple sailing vessel. That crossing was only the start of a series of adventures and strandings which amount to a Hebridean Odyssey. This unintended circumnavigation of Lewis and Harris drives the narrative for a series of linked tales with piano accompaniment. The scenes will be set by projected images of the Outer Hebrides.

Our five thought-provoking symposia provide space and time to reflect on the art and application of storytelling now and in the future. With a range of fascinating speakers, each event will be interactive, giving you a chance to think about issues raised, to try out some of the techniques yourself and to engage with the panel and with your peers.

STORYTELLING -**POWER OF ENGAGEMENT**

Wednesday 23 March 9.30am - 12.30pm

Storytelling has a unique power to engage us not just on a logical but an emotional level, to help us think differently about issues, to take us outside our typical thought patterns and open new vistas of imagination. This symposium, chaired by Donald Smith (Director of TRACS), features **Katrice Horsley** examining *Neuroscience and Narrative*, Beth Hamilton-Cardus, one half of Suit and Pace, talking about, and also giving us a chance to try out telling, Big Topic Tales: Issue-Based Storytelling for Children and Janis **Mackay** discussing Stories for a Better Nation, a project that paired traditional folklore with modern issues to provide space to consider fresh perspectives.



MORE THAN WORDS -STORYTELLING IN A SENSE

Wednesday 23 March 1.30pm - 4.30pm

Hearing and listening to stories is a fundamental part of the human experience, so how can this be inclusive for people with barriers to communication? This session gives you a chance to hear from Daniel Serridge and Joanne Marr (The Village Storytelling Centre) about our work over the year to produce a film with children from Linburn school who have additional and complex needs (screenings Friday 25th and Saturday 26th March) and also to create a story told through movement with **Possobilities** (Possil's disabled community) and **Indepen-dance** (performance Tuesday 22nd March). Hear Ailie Finlay talk about developing Stories to Squish, Smell and Shake for young children and learn some of her secrets. Maureen Phillips from PAMIS alongside Amanda Scott (Principle Teacher for SEN) will share their work on Sensory Stories for Sensitive Issues, reviewing the evidence behind multi-sensory storytelling to communicate with people with profound and multiple learning disabilities including using this to discuss sensitive issues.



PERSONAL STORYTELLING -EMPOWERMENT. ENTERTAINMENT **AND ETHICS**

Thursday 24 March 9.30am - 12.30pm

There is an increasing interest in personal autobiographical stories in several contexts. Chaired by Lisa Curtice (Chairperson of the Village and Programme Director at the Health and Social Care Alliance Scotland) we will explore the impact (intended and otherwise) of sharing our stories. Michael Williams will share his insights into *Illness*, storytelling, and self-management: a personal perspective; Joanne Marr and Douglas Mackay (The Village) and people they've worked with will discuss coproducing Stories of Recovery from substance misuse and what the resulting publications have meant to everyone involved. We'll also reflect on the ethical implications of collecting and sharing of personal stories, as **Emma Collins** (The Village) asks Whose Story Is It Anyway? Finally we will consider *The Rise of True Storytelling* as an ever more popular form of entertainment - speaker TBC.



STORYTELLING FOR HEALTH AND WELLBEING

Thursday 24 March 1.30pm - 4.30pm

There are many well-evidenced benefits of storytelling for health and well-being. Chaired by our Executive Director, Emma **Collins**, we explore some applications of storytelling in a health setting. Ruth Kirkpatrick, known for her work which goes to the heart of emotional wellbeing, will share her experience of working Eye to Eye, Mind to Mind and Heart to Heart – Storytelling and Wellbeing. John McCormack of the Scottish Recovery Network gives us an insight into the power of words to help people with mental health problems experience recovery through his presentation You Own Your Story, You Own Your Life, before leading us through The Hero's Journey. Also hear lessons about partnership working from Lauren Bianchi (The Village Storytelling Centre) and Fiona Sinclair (NHS), gained through our award winning project, Knowing Me, Knowing You, which took place in Gartnavel Royal Hospital's older people's wards.



THAT'S NOT STORYTELLING – AN ANCIENT TRADITION IN A MODERN WORLD

Friday 25 March 10am - 1pm

Michael Williams chairs this final session, which is sure to generate robust debate. In modern society, what counts as storytelling and how can this ancient tradition continue to be relevant to contemporary audiences? Tamar Williams (former young storyteller of the year) will explore *Staging the Story:* Exploring Traditional Storytelling on the Contemporary Stage. Daniel Serridge (The Village) will discuss storytelling through different art forms and invite us to consider whether That's Not Storytelling. David Campbell (performing Saturday 26th), internationally renowned ambassador of Scottish stories, reminds us that the oral bardic tradition remains highly relevant with Stories Now More Than Ever: The Enduring Art. We'll also hear from Cat **Gerrard** (of Tailspin, performing Thursday 24th) and **Naomi Wilds** (Adverse Camber - shows on Tuesday 22nd and Wednesday 23rd) about *Producing Contemporary Stories*, as they discuss setting up their respective contemporary storytelling companies. There'll be plenty of time to have your say during our panel discussion!
