Introduction

Scotland's biennial Contemporary and Community Storytelling Festival is back for 2024! Join us as we explore themes of identity and language through a diverse programme of performance from acclaimed international storytellers premiering new work in Scotland, award winning homegrown talent and exciting new emerging voices.

We are honoured to welcome Saffron, developed by Storytelling Centre Amsterdam and Palestinian dance artist Hala Salem. Critically acclaimed storyteller Niall Moorjani explores queerness, Scottish race and gender identities through a medieval-inspired landscape in A Faerie Tale. Story Jam returns with more mythic mayhem as we brace ourselves for tales to make you rip up the rules and riot with the Women Who Gave No F*cks (strictly 16+).

For younger audiences we are delighted to welcome the amazing Story Dome, an immersive storytelling experience that combines the magic of live storytelling with cutting-edge digital technology.

We will celebrate the diversity of our wonderful city of Glasgow, its people, and their stories through new performances developed in Scots, Gaelic and BSL. This year's commissions include Inheritance, Lorna Sithole Callery's autobiographical account of two siblings growing up in Pollok in the 1980s and 90s and *Smoke and Sickle*, Emery Hunter's retelling of the Selkie myth offering an exploration of identity, trust and manipulation.

We are proud to present community performances from our local neighbourhood of Pollok and across Glasgow who are at the heart of our work. These include an exploration of the importance of friendship and connection for adults with complex learning needs and insights into how language matters for the LGBTQ+ community. Our Young Storytellers are back with a performance about how being different can be cool, whilst the Barrhead Folk Collective return with some spooky stories.

We are delighted to co-host the annual conference of the Federation for European Storytelling alongside our performance programme. FEST will include a diverse programme of events, interrogating and celebrating the role of storytelling across society.

We can't wait to welcome you to #VSF24 and offer deepest thanks to all our supporters and, most importantly, the communities we work with.

Togail Naisean / **Re-Building a Nation**

Spoken word performer and Gaelic learner Martin O'Connor is revisiting his 2017 performance Togail Nàisean / Building a Nation to reflect on the process of language learning and performing in multiple languages. The original piece is an exploration of Scots and Gaelic languages through the personal relationship with voice, accent and dialect. Martin attempts to unearth the words that are lost when rural is swapped for urban, when deindustrialisation descends, and when we are disconnected from our cultural identity. This performance will include new insights into Martin's Scots and Gaelic learning journey in the current context for marginalised languages.

This isn't your usual coming-of-age narrative, it's a completely unique and honest perspective, finding humour and redemption in the darkest places from the interwoven experiences of two people who have lived it, and survived to tell the story. 
Smoke & Sickle


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
